Pastor's Letter
Notas del Pastor

Dear Parishioners and friends of Ascension,

I suspect that most of us remember vividly where we were, or what we were doing on the morning of Tuesday, September 11, 2001. That was a defining day in the history of our country. Time in our country now is often referenced as before or after 9/11. It's hard to believe that 15 years have passed since that horrible day. When the events of 9/11 unfolded, we saw two things: we saw the worst of humanity and we saw the very best of humanity. Countless stories have been told and documented, and there are even more stories that have not been told, about the goodness of countless people who found themselves in Manhattan that day.

I had the good fortune of being one of the priests who went to Ground Zero on a regular basis after the attacks. There were always priests at the site because each time firefighters and/or first responders would find remains, before the remains were given to an on-site medical examiner, the remains were brought to the priest so that the priest could, with the firefighters, pray over the remains. That was such an important part of their finding remains - that their lost ones be remembered and prayed for. On few occasions in my life, have I ever felt such a sense of the sacred.

Now that fifteen years have passed, we reflect on some of the valuable lessons we have learned particularly for us as a people of faith. We learned, and continue to be reminded of the fact that healing is a process. You can never put a timeline on healing. Often it takes the length of a lifetime. The healing that continues to take place is physical, emotional, mental and spiritual. When events like 9/11 unfold, our values are challenged and it's then that we see what really matters most in life.

There is a never-ending supply of good in the world. It sounds strange, but over and over again we see that in the midst of terrible times, the good in people continues to shine. Americans all over the country came together after September 11th. For that moment in time, all races, ethnicities, and religions joined together to mourn those who were lost, rebuild what had fallen, and create a renewed sense of community. It wasn't the first time that would happen, — and it certainly wasn't the last. We saw it after Hurricane Katrina, after the 2010 earthquake in Haiti, and after the shootings at Sandy Hook. We continue to see that on a day-to-day basis. September 11th taught us the value and impact of compassion and mercy. Our task is to live our lives at peak goodness and humanity, even when we're not in a crisis situation. If we do that, we'll never lose our sense of hope that the world truly can be a better place. Hopefully, on this fifteenth anniversary of 9/11, we will remember not only the tragedies of that day, but also the goodness that was put on display for the whole world to see. Wouldn't it be great if we could renew our commitment to faith, hope and charity vis a vis the events of 9/11.

Let's continue to pray for all those whose lives were affected and changed on 9/11, those who died, and those who reached out in goodness and charity without worrying about the cost or the risk. Let's also continue to pray for world peace.

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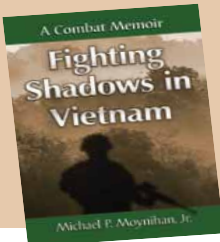
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In this memoir, set as deeply in his mind as in the Southeast Asian jungle, a young American soldier embarks on a journey to a war that, for him, will never be over.
